Scott Kelly, Leeds City Council

Workshop level: Intermediate / Practical

C. Council tax support for UC claimants: perspective from a local authority

Many local authorities are reviewing their Council Tax Support schemes, increasingly so that their scheme can be administered more effectively and efficiently for universal credit claimants. Corin Hammersley gives a perspective on the challenges for local authorities, the differences in administering this benefit for UC claimants, and explains what data is shared regarding UC awards.

NAWRA workshop levels:

SPEAKERS

Sue Royston is the volunteer coordinator of universal credit research at Citizens Advice Craven and Harrogate Districts. Harrogate was chosen by the DWP to be the location for the UC managed migration pilot. Sue is also an adviser on universal credit to the <u>Disability Benefits Consortium (DBC)</u> and part of her presentation is based on a report she has recently written for the DBC.

Simon Duffy is the founder and director of the <u>Centre for Welfare Reform</u>. He speaks regularly on television and radio about the welfare state and social policy. He is best known for inventing personal budgets and for designing systems of self-directed support. He works as a consultant and researcher with local social innovators and national governments.

Sarah Clarke is a solicitor at the <u>Public Law Project</u> (PLP). PLP employs specialist lawyers who assist individuals experiencing personal disadvantage, or charities or organisations representing the interests of marginalised or disadvantaged groups. PLP also employs expert academics and researchers. PLP undertakes research and policy work, provides training and support to lawyers and advisers and carries out legal casework including strategic litigation. Strategic litigation is where a legal case is taken on with the intention of changing the way a system works to help many people.
