A. UC take-up campaign: Disabled Child and Carers elements

Val Barrass, Rachel O'Donnell, Marie Martin, Lisa Sinfield and Julia Waterhouse, Durham Welfare Rights

Welfare Rights Officers from Durham's 'Campaign Team' will outline a take-up campaign which used Council Tax Reduction data to identify over 100 households on Universal Credit with a disabled child who appeared to be missing out on either the Disabled Child Element or the Carers Element of UC. So far, 64 households have received advice to secure their full entitlement, and 52 households have increased their monthly UC or have received arrears. The campaign raises important policy issues about the administration of Universal Credit for households with disabled children.

B. Social care services in England

Paul Treloar, Age UK and Keith Thompson Northumberland County Council

This workshop aims to help welfare rights advisers understand more about how eligibility for social care services is assessed and charged for in England. Many advisers will be dealing with clients with long-term health conditions or impairments that may mean, as well as helping them to establish entitlement to benefits like PIP, they should be flagging the possibility of securing care and support from their local authority. We will explain how needs are assessed, how the financial assessment is carried out and also explore the linkages between benefits and social care services.

C. Finding the right balance of probability

Duncan Wall, Durham Welfare Rights

This is a workshop designed to examine and explore the attitudes of the DWP and HMCTS to the evidence required to prove entitlement.

The workshop will be discussion led and cover the following topics:

- The burden of proof and its potential erosion
- Medical records
- Inferences and rebuttal
- Credibility and tactics
- Requirements for written submissions

Workshop level: Advanced/Practical

D. Managed migration – unpicking some of the trickier bits

Jane Crawford, Housing Systems

In this workshop we will use case studies to discuss issues such as the timing of the UC claim, retrospective changes and how to ensure UC is maximised. For some claimants, identifying the 'best time' within their 3-month window to make their UC claim will make a difference to the amount of benefit they can receive. So we will also discuss the added complication of when the annual uprating of benefits falls within the 3-month window.

The workshop is aimed at those who already have a good understanding of the managed migration process and transitional protection.

LOCATION AND TRANSPORT



The conference will take place in-person at Durham Town Hall, Market Place, Durham DH1 3NJ.

How to get here:

Road: Durham is easily accessible by road and the city centre is situated just 2 miles from junction 62 of the A1(M). If you are driving to the Town Hall you will need to head towards the city centre. The Town Hall does not have its own car park but parking is available in the city centre car parks. Your best option may be parking at one of the three <u>park and ride stations</u> that serve the city centre and are based on major routes.

Rail: Trains from many UK towns and cities travel direct to Durham. The station lies on the UK East Coast main line, one stop south of Newcastle. It is just over 3 hours by train from Birmingham, 2½ hours from Manchester, 2 hours from Edinburgh and just 45 minutes from York.

Bus: Many buses serve the city centre from all across the region. The only bus that travels into the market place is the <u>Cathedral bus</u>. Otherwise, the buses stop at either Claypath or Milburngate Bridge and the Town Hall is a short walk away. The <u>Traveline website</u> is a good way to plan your journey to Durham.

Cycle: National Cycle Routes <u>14</u> and <u>70</u> go through Durham city.

ON THE DAY

Inside the Town Hall

The oldest section of the Town Hall is the Guildhall and it dates from 1356. It was originally a timber formed building which was rebuilt in stone in 1535. Today's conference will be held in the Main Hall with workshops being run in various rooms throughout the Town Hall.
